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## Clustered Supportive Supervisory Meeting for Optimising DMPA/SC Uptake in Plateau State



ARFH initiated the monthly clustered supportive supervisory meeting aimed at optimising the DMPA-SC/SI uptake across project implementing LGAs in Plateau State. This is to ensure quality program implementation continues despite the vast and difficult geographical terrain, high number of facilities, and incessant security challenges that make routine facility supportive supervision almost impossible.

The clustered supportive supervisory meeting provided unique opportunity for family planning facility focal persons from hard to reach areas to be organised into clusters with key objectives of accessing continuous hands-on training on quality service delivery as well as effective DMPA-SC/SI administration, and documentation.

The result showed over 80% increase in uptake of DMPA-SC across the implementing LGAs, with an appreciable increase in facility initiated self-injection clients.

## **ARFH** Conducts Orientation for CBOs on Active TB Case Finding in 12 States

Globally, the World Health Organisation reports that about 5,000 TB related deaths are recorded daily, of which, 95% occur in low- and middle-income countries (WHO, 2017). Nigeria ranks among the 30 high burden countries for tuberculosis (TB), TB/HIV, and Multidrug-Resistant TB (MDR-TB). In order to halt this tragic trend, ARFH in collaboration with National Tuberculosis and Leprosy Control Programme (NTBLCP) held a one-day orientation workshop for partner Community Based Organisations on active TB case finding.

The workshop which was hands-on focused on learning innovative strategies to scale up TB case finding in 12 states in Nigeria. In addition, the participants acquired information about the basic facts on TB, advocacy and community mobilisation strategies, awareness creation, identification of presumptive TB cases, as well as sputum collection and documentation.

We will continue to work with all our partners and community stakeholders to ensure prompt access to high-quality, patient centred TB diagnosis and treatment in Nigeria.

## **Economic Empowerment of Adolescents and Young Persons in Lagos**



the USAID funded ARFH through ICHSSA2 project recently empowered 198 adolescents and young persons who have acquired vocational skills with business startup items across all the supported 10 LGAs to boost their income, increase economic independence, reduce vulnerability to poverty and exposure to HIV.

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After thorough needs assessment, the beneficiaries received vital financial literacy training to develop and scale their business and become economically stable to meet their basic needs and that of their families.

Following this training and empowerment, Hassan, one of the beneficiaries who received a presser machine resolved to work to put his skills to good use and build a successful business so he could support his family and also help others.

Interventions like the Household Economic Strengthening is not only critical to unlocking economic opportunities and ensuring vulnerable households are food secure, but also needed to mitigate the impact of HIV/AIDS.
